Sabbatical Revisited

We all know that pastors are on call for their congregations 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. We also know that Pastor Steve has performed over 100 memorial services in addition to his regular pastoral duties since he has been our pastor. With this in mind, it should be easy to understand why pastors need sabbaticals to renew their spirits.

Several years ago, our Personnel Team created an *ad hoc* committee to develop a sabbatical program for the pastors of our church. After much prayer and discernment, the *ad hoc* committee presented their recommendation to the Personnel Team and on January 28, 2021, your elected representatives, the Church Council, approved the Sabbatical Leave policy.

Why did we do this? It is proven that having a sabbatical program helps in sustaining pastoral staff; it encourages physical and spiritual renewal and well-being of our pastors; it is considered a best practice in church ministry; and it is an inexpensive benefit that we can provide for our pastors (less than one percent of our personnel budget). In addition, because the sabbatical includes a time of study, it joins our scholarship program and pastoral resident program as part of our church's commitment to being a "teaching church."

For those of you who are wondering, full-time pastors are eligible for sabbatical after five years of continuous service and every five years thereafter. Pastor Devin was the first to take a sabbatical last year and he came back to our church with a renewed spirit for his ministry among us. We have the same hope for Pastor Steve.

So, what happens while Pastor Steve is gone? We, as a congregation will be praying for him and will be looking to renew our spirits, our ministries, and our church life. We are supported by a phenomenal pastoral staff. Pastors John, Devin, Jennifer, and Shawn will continue to meet the needs of our congregation by leading us in worship, making pastoral visits, performing memorial services and weddings, and handling day-to-day operations.

Please continue to be in prayer for Pastor Steve and our church during this sabbatical time.

A native of Jones, Oklahoma, Timothy attended Adrian College where he received his B.A. in Religious Studies with a focus in Feminist Ethics before earning his Master of Divinity degree from Yale University's School of Divinity. Currently, he is pursuing his Doctorate of Ministry degree at Emory University's Candler School of Theology. Prior to his current role as Senior Pastor at Emerywood Baptist Church, Timothy served churches in Michigan, Connecticut, and Texas. When he's not chasing around his horse-size sheepdogs, Frankie and Cardozo, you can find him searching for the best pie with his wife Valerie Lott.



I finished *No Cure for Being Human* by Dr. Kate Bowler earlier this month. Dr. Bowler is a professor at Duke Divinity School. I never had her as a professor because my first year she was diagnosed with stage IV cancer. She was 35 at the time and her son Zach had just turned two. Her first book titled *Everything Happens for a Reason: And Other Lies I've Loved* tells about the early days of her illness and her struggle against cliché explanations. This second book differs as she explores the miracle of her continued existence and pushes back against secular culture's promise that we can have it all if we just do fill-in-the-blank-fad. She has a wonderful sense of humor and a deep faith in God. If you are tired of being told to live your "best life now" this book is for you.

Another book I've been reading this month is titled "*The Seven Transforming Gifts of Menopause: An Unexpected Spiritual Journey*" by Cheryl Bridges Johns. Dr. Johns holds a PhD from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and weaves her faith, personal experience, and research she's done to talk about menopause in a positive way. It's been an interesting read because no matter when I have it out-at a coffee shop, in a doctor's office, at the park,-people stop and ask me about it. It turns out menopause, while no longer being called a curse, is still an incredibly taboo topic. I've found Dr. Johns writing to be encouraging and practical. I'd recommend women read it, especially those who are or did struggle with this stage in their life. I've ordered a copy for our library which should arrive in the next couple of weeks!

Your Neighbors in the Pew - Marian Smith by Julie A. Best



Marian Smith is another of our members who has been a part of our church for many years. In all those years, she has been involved in so many activities. In any given situation, if you were to say - who will help us, the name of Marian Smith is likely to surface. Those helping hands started very early in life.

Marian was born and raised on a farm in northern Illinois, near the town of Forreston. She went to a one-room school from the first through the eighth grades. The school was about a mile from her home, built on land donated by her grandparents. She walked to school, and met up with others along the way. Marian says, "In those days, education was rather loose. I was allowed to grade papers, and help the younger children with their reading." She became a helper right from the very start.

She went to high school in the town of Forreston. She was valedictorian of her graduating class of 25 students. Upon graduation, she went to Luther College in Decorah, Iowa. After two years, she married and along came five sons. So for many years, she was a full-time mother. She did complete her degree, taking a few courses at a time, and graduated with a teaching certificate. At the age of 40, she got her first teaching position.

Marian's husband, Paul (who is deceased), had a career with Boy Scouts of America. He was an accountant and taught the Boy Scout accounting system to clubs throughout the country. They lived in Texas, and as Paul made business trips, he would look for potential retirement communities. He narrowed the search to within 100 miles of Asheville, NC. He thought that the terrain in that region was beautiful, the weather was mild, and that geographical location would get them both closer to their Illinois and Wisconsin parents. Tellico Village became the community of choice, and they moved here in 1998.

Right away, Marian became involved with Crafters. Then she joined the Christian Women's Club of the Village, and taught Bible studies as a part of that group. When the Neighborhood opened, Marian offered to teach a Bible study there, and continued to do so until COVID hit. Marian says, "I loved those people, and I miss them so much."

Marian was also a teacher for Children's Sunday School and very active in the Children's Ministry. She has also helped with the Kitchen Ministry's spaghetti supper and other functions.

Then there is Kindred Spirits. Marian coordinated fun experiences for some of our older members who enjoyed taking interesting outings. Marian says, "We started taking those trips, even before the church had a bus." Now, Marian consults with Patty DeLawter, who has assumed coordination of that group.

Marian is also a Stephen Minister. She was a member of the fifth class. She serves as the leader of the Parkinson's Support Group, and is a co-leader of the Care Givers Support Group. In addition to all of these activities, Marian is a great friend. She has helped so many folks get through hard times in their lives. Marian has a big heart that will give, and give, and give some more.

Marian's five sons have produced 10 grandchildren, and those 10 grandchildren have given her 16 great grandchildren! What a wonderful family.

Marian, we are so grateful for all that you do for our church. Your helping hands have been a blessing to so many. Yours is an example that we all should follow - here am I, send me.



Cancer, Now What? By Jeannine Wolf

Your Stephen Ministry Team provides some resources that may be of help to you. There are many good books in our church library and some are from the Stephen Ministry Organization. Their newest book is "Cancer, Now What?" This book was written for those who have been diagnosed with cancer or for their loved ones. Kenneth C. Haugh, the founder of Stephen Ministry, put together a team of 17 individuals which then:

- conducted 173 focus groups;
- interviewed 1,037 cancer survivors, loved ones of those diagnosed with cancer, and medical professionals;
- studied the comments and suggestions of thousands of readers;
- engaged in many in-depth discussions about the best way to make the book simple yet profound, exhaustive without being exhausting.

This team put over 35,000 hours into this project. The focus groups alone contained over 3,500 people who had experience with 81 different kinds of cancer. These individuals included people who have had cancer; loved ones of those diagnosed with cancer; medical professionals in oncology and other fields; and some having cancer themselves or whose loved ones had cancer.

The goal of this book is to give a practical guide in helping those with cancer and their loved ones address the medical, emotional, relational, and spiritual challenges that cancer brings. The fact that you can read it from cover to cover or skip around from chapter to chapter, depending on your needs, is what I love about this book. Its easy, understandable, straight forwardness will answer all your questions or give you the resources to find answers to any concerns you may have. As a former nurse, I believe this is the best book written on cancer to help people facing this challenge.

SHANGRI-LA THERAPEUTIC ACADEMY OF RIDING

Due to your generous contributions, CCTV is providing financial support to the Shangri-La Therapeutic Academy of Riding – STAR.

Last month your Mission Team was blessed with the opportunity to tour their facility on Hwy 11 in Lenoir City. We were greeted by Lynn Petr, founder and Executive Director who shared the history, mission, and programming at STAR. This was followed by an “all access” tour of the impressive facility and grounds.

STAR works with children and adults starting at age four to seniors with physical, mental, and neurological disabilities or those considered at-risk. They serve individuals from Anderson, Blount, Campbell, Fentress, Knox, Loudon, Jefferson, Monroe, McMinn, Roane, Sevier, and surrounding counties. The mission of STAR is to foster personal achievement by providing therapeutic experiences using horse related activities for persons with disabilities or other special challenges.

STAR began in 1987 as Lynn Petr’s Therapeutic Recreation Master’s thesis project at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville. The program started with five riders, one horse, three volunteers and one employee (Lynn). In 2002, 63 acres of fantastic pastureland was purchased in Loudon County and the quest began to construct the stable and outdoor arena. Those were completed in 2004 and full operations began that spring. The Education Building was completed in 2007 followed by the Indoor Arena in 2008.

“We’re excited to celebrate 35 years of serving the East Tennessee community,” said STAR executive director Lynn Petr. “Every day, our participants feel empowered to accomplish more than they thought was possible, and our Knoxville and Lenoir City communities have stepped up in an incredible way to help us maintain and grow our programming.”

A few months ago, a member brought up the fact we talk a bunch about stewardship in the fall but then we never really mention our church budget again. I agreed with them. Talking about our budget can be a bit boring. It's not as exciting as a special offering or shopping for an angel tree child. Giving to a general fund doesn't always carry the same level of satisfaction a specific gift does.

Yet, the general budget is what allows us to function as a community church. Your pledges to the ordinary allow us to carry out extraordinary ministry. One thing your gift does is allow our staff to obtain mileage reimbursement at the set IRS rate (0.585 per mile). This has been especially helpful this year as we have all experienced high gas prices! Our pastors drive "all over creation" as we say in the south to make hospital visits, gather with members in their homes, and attend retreats and conferences. Combined Pastor Steve and I drove over 4,000 miles in 2021 and that is low due to coming out of the pandemic! Your giving enables us to be the pastoral presence wherever we are needed. Thank you for your faithful giving!
